

One of the big things about Christmas is presents, so we're going to start with them. It's absolutely okay if you didn't bring a present. Just coming to church, many of you received one... and I'm going to invite you to share them when I call out the number that's on it.

The Presents



our nativity

1) Angel

Our first present is an angel. While we know they are an angel because of the wings, the real sign of an angel is that they are messengers from God. Angels are important.

This angel looks gentle. We don't really know what they look like, but angel's often have to start by saying, "Do not be afraid." - which suggests that people are scared. It could be that they look scary, or that people are afraid of what they might do or say. They could destroy cities, though more often they delivered messages that led to big changes - changes that aren't easy, ...though they do make the world better.

The Angel reminds us that God sends us messages.

2) Mary

This is Mary. She is on her knees. Sometimes people get on their needs to tend something - like flowers, or a child. Sometimes people get on their knees to show respect for somebody. Sometimes they collapse to their knees if they receive really really big news.

An angel has come to Mary. As a messenger from God, they deserve respect. Mary is told that God would like her to become the mother of God's son. Consider that Mary was completely unimportant... this is really really big news for her (and the whole world). It is also hard news, because becoming pregnant outside of marriage means that Mary would normally be kicked out of her family and town... or killed. Mary may not look it here, but she is very courageous to accept the danger of God's invitation.

Mary reminds us of what can happen when we have the courage to say yes.

3) Joseph

This is Joseph. When he enters the story he's struggling. If he marries Mary, who is not pregnant from him, he wouldn't have to worry about being killed like Mary did, but he would be unable to get any work. Even if he wanted this family, how could he support them? Then the angel comes in a dream. The stakes increase. Can he be the step-father of the son-of-God?

Life doesn't go as Joseph had imagined, but with God's help it all works out.

Joseph reminds us that when we follow, God will look after us.

3.5) Donkey

The donkey has packages tied to his back. He, like so many

before him, is bearing other people's burdens. Joseph & Mary are forced by the Roman invaders to report to another city to be counted for taxes. The donkey works to help - without any credit.

The donkey reminds us that following God requires help and work.

4) Cow & Manger (and Stable)

Here we have a cow, a food trough, and a stable. To state the obvious, it's not a fancy hotel or friendly home. It's definitely not a palace for a king. A stable is the only place Joseph and Mary could find to stay. If we asked the cow, she'd tell us the stable was well looked after and cleaned twice a day. Nobody in the scene owns it, but they are allowed to stay here out of the wind & weather.

This setting reminds us that God came into the world, not to be pampered with the 1%, but to be with those who were struggling.

5) Baby

This is a baby. A human baby. Like other human babies, it cries & poos... and is an amazing miracle. This baby is Jesus, the Son of God. He reminds us that God became human. God, the Creator of the Universe, became one of us.

6) Shepherd

This is a shepherd. While this one looks young, he has it hard. He must make sure that the sheep in his care find food and water. If anything shows up, he puts his life on the line to rescue them. If one is missing, he goes to find it. He works hard - with lousy hours.

The angel visited the shepherds too. Instead of telling the 'important' people that God's son had been born in Bethlehem, the angel tells the shepherds working the night shift. This is amazing. And when the shepherds see the baby - they are even more amazed. Meeting God as a human baby, they run and share the news with everyone they can find.

The shepherds remind us that again that God comes to ordinary people, even forgotten people... and that this is exciting.

7-9) Magi

In a land far away well educated people, Magi, notice that God is doing something that will change the world. They were probably priests in a different religion. They were definitely outsiders. Yet they were welcome to celebrate God's glory on earth.

The Magi remind us that God's coming includes outsiders, the intellectual, and the elite.

Combined, the nativity presents us with a vision of God coming to all people (ordinary, elite, those part of the community, and outsiders) - coming as a vulnerable human baby through the courage of ordinary people.

This is the ultimate Christmas present for us... and for us to share.



Let's take a little look at a few other nativities.



Here's one I saved as 'hipster nativity'. Is this what it would be like now? Selfies? texting? presents from amazon? It's fun... but does it remind us of the good news? ...could it be used to tell about the good news?

This isn't the nativity, but it includes so much of the story. Joseph and Mary are trying to find a place to stay by King David's motel. She's on a donkey under the star. The Holy Spirit, or dove, is flying over Mary. They even have halos. More to the point, it shows God coming through ordinary people trying to follow - and life growing in improbable ways.

This morning I heard about the Israeli government approving another 19 settlements in the occupied West Bank,⁵ and about a Palestinian house being attacked, tear gassed, and livestock killed. It reminded me of this nativity from Bethlehem in 2023. The bombings in Gaza made it easy to find the rubble.




5 total of 160, with 69 in the last three years.

This is the nativity this year at Lake St Church in Evanstown (a suburb of Chicago). It's set after the birth when the soldiers come looking for the baby called King of the Jews. These soldiers had ICE on their vests. Mary and Joseph wore gas masks to protect them from gas attacks. Jesus has his wrists zip tied... like the ICE offers have been doing in the Chicago area. Vandals attacked the display and Joseph was destroyed. The second time they decapitated Mary - so the church put up a sign explaining that Mary was suspected to be in detention, but the family couldn't find where she was being held.

...is this disrespectful? or distracting from the good news? or does it reflect the Christmas message?




Our last vision of God's coming comes from the Gospel According to John.

Both the people in the gospel and the original people it was written for were living in poverty and oppression from Roman occupation. In the case of the people it was written for, Rome had destroyed the Temple in Jerusalem, and now they were being kicked out of their synagogues because they believed Jesus was the Messiah. What they believed was important. It could put them into conflict with the government and their neighbours.

So, what does this passage say about God coming? What's this version of the Christmas story present? What gift can we receive from it?

Sermon: What's the Word?

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

After years of debating, the people deciding what should go into the Newer Testament chose, with the help of the Holy Spirit, to include the four different gospel accounts. Mark doesn't give Iesus an origin story - He just shows up and it's all go go go. The Gospel According to Matthew starts by telling us how Jesus is connected back to Father Abraham through King David. Luke connects Jesus back to Adam. As you just heard, John goes even further back. The first chapter of the Bible tells of how God spoke creation into being - and Jesus was the Word8 that made it happen. For those early Christians, believing in Jesus was not creating some new god, but acknowledging the one who was God's active presence in bringing life to... everything.

Like the other stories of Jesus coming, this one acknowledges that there is darkness, and into darkness God brings a great light. This light helps us to see clearly flaws/sins in our own lives and our society. The Light also shows us the way towards hope. Jesus being the source of light was world shaping for those early Christians. The inclusion of John in the passage shows a good way to share the light. Unlike in some other passages, he's not ranting against anyone. He is simply pointing to where he finds the Light.

And that is in the Word became flesh. This wasn't a metaphor. God became all fleshy like us (and by 'us' don't just think just people of Kensington, but all people). This takes the relationship to a new level. They knew that God was with them, but now God had become one of them - one of us. Sometimes kids say to their parents, "You have no idea what it's like!", and the parents think, "I was there once." In Jesus, God was one of us. God knows. This was revolutionary.

Also revolutionary was the part that all who believe can also be children of God. The Word of God coming to light the world as a human Jesus so that we may become children of God. This leads to questions of how. How's that happen? How do we live it? As God experienced a human life, how do we experience the Divine? How do we respond?

We'll be exploring this with the Gospel According to John until after Easter, but for now remember that Jesus is one with God since before the beginning, that through Jesus we can find life as children of God... and that Jesus is not just present with us, but one of us - which is the best Christmas present ever.

To God be all the glory Amen.

Actions: Brainstorm who you can share the Christmas message you're relating to.


Actions: Take the risk and wish people a Merry Christmas.

Amen.




The joy of the angels,



MISSION MOMENT Sunday, December 21

Pakistan is listed among the world's worst-performing countries in education indicators. Poverty, child labour, gender discrimination and harmful norms within a highly patriarchal society impede equal access to education, particularly for girls. In response, PWS&D is implementing a school feeding project with its partner in Pakistan to encourage girls' school attendance in marginalized communities in Umerkot. Meena, a participant in the program, shares that receiving a goat as part of the School Feeding Project has become about much more



than just an animal—it is a symbol of her family's commitment to education and community well-being. "Providing milk to the school is my responsibility, and I take pride in doing it because I know it benefits not just my daughter but all the children in our village. Their health and future matter to me," she shares.


