☀ Intro to the readings

Today's psalm is 145. Well, selected verses of it. I invite you to read it all at some point because it's all good - but a little long for this morning.

Our main reading is from the book of Isaiah. At 66 chapters, this book get's first place in the prophets section of the Bible. In scope it covers over 200 years. If you're thinking that's an impossibly long time for one person... others have noticed that too. Scholars don't think it was all one person. The differences in historical details, writing style, and subject matter suggest at least three sections. The first 39 chapters are messages and descriptions from when the Assyrians took Israel (the northern kingdom) - making it late 8th century to early 7th. The next section (chapters 40-55) takes place during the exile from Jerusalem (southern kingdom) about 200 years later - when Jeremiah and Ezekiel were also delivering the word from God. Then the third part (56-66) is after the return to Jerusalem.

Why, you may ask, if it's from different times and not all one person is it all called Isaiah? The recordings would have started with a person named Isaiah who God chose to deliver messages to the Israelites. The book is organized to deliver a message as a continuation of those initial prophecies through later prophecies and events. The message starts by condemning the collective sin

of the nation, that God will apply corrective judgment through other nations... and does, and then moves to news of restoration. It is a story of consequences for being self centred, God's loyalty/faithfulness, and hope.

Today we're going to hear the last chapter of the second section - aimed at those in exile. As Rose starts reading it, imagine someone standing in a busy market place and trying to get people's attention.

How's your gift shopping going?

As I've been talking to people this week, the topic of gifts came up several times. Parents and grandparents were sharing their struggle with what to get the kids. They struggled with the expectation to give something, but that the kids seemed to have everything already. I suggested giving an experience, but apparently they already have that. I suggested wrapping something from the back of the closet, but they didn't think that would cut it.⁴

I also heard a piece on the CBC this week about gifts. I think it was with a psychologist. He pointed out that when people remember childhood gift giving times (Christmas/Hanukkah/Eidi) their memories are focused on special foods, usually sweets, and relationships. His advice for a memorable gift is a box of instant cake mix that you make together for breakfast.


As is usual when we read passages from the Bible, our experiences shape what we see in them. This week I think Isaiah 55 is about gifts. It even supports what the psychologist said.

The passage starts with a basic need: water. It's hard to focus on anything when your basic needs aren't met. God's word here starts with, "Come to the water." That said, the word quickly expands to food and wine and milk - all you can take, without price. It reminds me of other stories in the Bible. There's a passage back in Isaiah 25 about God hosting a feast for all nations

Another great idea is to go to the 'gifts of change' with the Presbyterian World Service & Development (PWS&D). It's something that makes the world better and doesn't clutter up anyone's home. of the best food and drink. The first miracle in the gospel of John is Jesus turning water into wine - in ridiculous abundance. And there's another story in John about Jesus sitting by a well. There he discusses the gift of water - and that while the Samaritan woman can give him some refreshing water, God can give her living water. All she has to do is incline her ear and accept the gift and she will never have thirst/need again. And this is part of what's going on here. God is offering to meet the needs of everyone who thirsts - physical and more.

Another part of this gift is God offering to "make with you an everlasting covenant". In case you don't remember, a covenant is a serious commitment to someone, a sacred vow. This is about relationships - a vital gift. God created us to be in relationships - with God, other people, and creation. When that's missing, we are not well. God's giving his word that we can depend on a sure & solid relationship of love. That this relationship between God and the people will be so full of hope, peace, love, & joy that nations will come to find out more - and the gifts of God's love will be shared.

In verse one it says this is "without price", but is it really? Verse two questions how we spend our money on things that aren't really good for the community. It reminds me of a

The passage tells us to only "eat what is good", to "incline your ear" and "Seek the Lord". The wicked are to "abandon their way of life, and the unrighteous their way of thinking." While this isn't about giving up money, it is giving things up. Some of it is actually things - like products that will still be in our landfill in seven generations. Eating only what is good can refer to our viewing intake: such as TV and social media. Taking time to look for God, listen to God, and avoid thinking in ways that are unrighteous (ie. not right with God)... this involves changing the way we live and think. This involves giving up things and ways. It's a cost.

Is this required? Must you pay this cost to receive the gifts of God? Part of the word here is that "my thoughts and not your thoughts, nor are my ways your ways." This comes right after the line about anyone who turns to God will be forgiven. God's justice isn't about punishment or retribution; it's about love, hope and healing. God doesn't even come back to us saying, 'hey, you own me', or 'I helped you, now it's your turn to help me.' God's ways are not our ways. This is the awkward balance of God's gift given "without cost", yet there are consequences to not "eating what is good".

You could think about somebody offering you a coffee. If you don't take it, you can't enjoy it. If you push it away, you may end up with hot coffee everywhere.

This passage talks about God's word. You could think of this balance as words. If somebody gives you a compliment? What about if they try to speak a correction to you? Both can be a gift,

conversation at the morning prayer group about the commercialism of Christmas; it's focused on gifts for ourselves rather than God's gift of Jesus. Verse two questions what we spend our money on, and that God's gift to us doesn't cost money... but I don't think it's really "without price".

depending on how you receive them.

As we get to the end of this section of Isaiah we are reminded about the nature of God's word. Like rain that falls in a desert, God's word transforms those who listen. Lives will bloom in ways nobody could imagine. "You shall go out in joy and be led back in peace; the mountains and the hills before you shall burst into song... instead of thorns, there will be mighty trees and beautiful flowers." This is God's gift for those who let their hard surface relax and soak in God's word. They will receive God's gifts of love, hope & healing.

...which would be a nice place to stop, except it misses a big part of the passage. This talk of gifts has fallen into one of the criticisms of Christmas - it's become very individualistic or selfcentred.

The 'you' that is addressed isn't you... it is 'all y'all' or 'youse' - it is all of our society - our nation, and "nations that do not know you" (verse 5). The gift of abundance is not just for you, or even us Christians... it is for everyone.

This week I followed-up on something I heard about at the

national meetings I go to. It's called the Halo Effect. This measures the socio-economic benefit that a religious congregation contributes to its local community. According to their research, for every dollar in an urban congregation budget, they save the city \$3.39 in providing social services and other benefits. That's a pretty good gift.

But the God's word is more than that. It is about saving creation, people, and us from poor choices - from our sins. It's the gift of a beautiful way of living that will bring love, hope & healing.

Responding to God

FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Actions: Consider giving people 'gifts of change' through the Presbyterian World Service and Development

Values: Over the next week, how will you 'incline your ear' and 'seek God'? (hold each other accountable)

Pray, be patient, and hold each other accountable.

(If this is new to you, it's easier to start small.)

Prayer: ...think of somebody you think needs to hear God's word of love, hope & healing. Pray for them... and be aware God might use you.

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

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MISSION MOMENT Sunday, December 14

Shaibu Mohammed, a 7-year-old boy from Gbanterago in northern Ghana, was born with a disability caused by prolonged labour, and has never walked. Due to a lack of transportation, his parents were unable to enroll him in school. One day, Shaibu's mother walked to the PWS&D-supported Community-Based Rehabilitation Programme (CBR) office



to report her son's situation and seek help. After a home visit and assessment, the CBR team provided Shaibu with a tricycle. Additionally, the Inclusive Education Officer coordinated with Gbanterago Primary School for his enrollment. Grateful, his mother said, "My child can now go to school like other kids in our community. What a great relief! Thank you so much for this kind gesture."

Gaza Aid Brings Relief
